A Word from Pope Francis

Brothers and sisters, this is the crossroads we face with God: fear or trust. Either you are afraid before God, or you trust in the Lord. And we, like the protagonists of the parable - all of us - have received talents, all of us, far more precious than money. But much of how we invest them depends on our trust in the Lord, which frees our hearts, makes us active and creative in goodness. Do not forget this: trust frees, always; fear paralyses. Remember: fear paralyses, trust liberates. This also applies to the education of children. And let us ask ourselves: do I believe that God is the Father and entrusts gifts to me because He trusts me? And do I trust in Him to the point of putting myself on the line, even when the results are neither certain nor to be taken for granted? Am I able to say every day in prayer, "Lord, I trust in You, give me the strength to keep going; I trust in You, in the things You have given me: let me know how to carry them forward".

Finally, also as Church: do we cultivate a climate of trust, of mutual esteem in our environments, that helps us to move forward together, that unlocks people and stimulates the creativity of love in everyone? Let us think about it. **POPE FRANCIS**



The visit of the relic of Blessed Carlo Acutis to the Archdiocese of Dublin Carlo was born in London to Italian parents, but grew up in Milan, Italy, where his family relocated when he was just a child. From a young age, he displayed an extraordinary devotion to his Catholic faith. He attended Mass daily, regularly receiving the sacraments. He was known for centering his life on the Eucharist. "Always to be united with Jesus," he would say, "this is my programme of life." Carlo set up a website documenting Eucharistic miracles, and is now considered a patron saint of the internet. On October 10, 2020, he was beatified by Pope Francis, becoming the first millennial to be declared 'Blessed' by the Catholic Church. It was said at the time that his beatification highlighted "the significance of his witness, particularly for the younger generation, demonstrating that holiness is attainable even in our modern world".



BOOK REVIEW. THE MIRACLE SEED. FOR YOUNG READERS 7-12yrs

The one last holdout was the mountain fortress of Masada, but that too was overrun in A.D. 74. The fortress was abandoned, leaving clothes, coins, weapons, and household items to be covered by 2000 years of dust and sand. Among the household items was a jar of date seeds—specifically, seeds of the Judean date tree, long prized for the sweetness and medicinal value of its fruit.

While the ruins of Masada slept, the Judean date tree was growing extinct. Whether by climate or war, the trees were cut or strangled or starved until, by A.D. 1000, there were none left. But fast-forward to 1964, when a team or archaeologists trekked up the narrow path to Masada and uncovered its long-lost treasures, including a jar of date seeds. Forty years later, two women—a medical researcher and a botanist, began to wonder if the Judean date tree could be resuscitated through one of those Masada seeds. After 2000 years? Highly unlikely. But it was worth a try . . .

The carefully researched and beautifully rendered book tells the story of the "ordinary miracle" of organic life. While making no direct reference to God and his creation, the text includes quotes from classical Judaism, the Psalms, and C. S. Lewis. It also underscores the outsized contributions Jews have made to science, medicine, and technology in the modern age. This is a story worth knowing, told in a readable and engaging graphic-novel format.
